

## **Title Cream Pitcher**

Date about 1810-1820

Primary Maker Unknown

Medium Mold-formed buff-colored earthenware with a blue-tinted glaze, underglaze cobalt blue decoration, and overglaze gilding

Description Oval cream pitcher of buff-colored earthenware with a blue-tinted glaze, a type of ceramic known as pearlware. The body swells from an oval foot with vertical bands of ribbing half way up the cream pitcher, before narrowing to an oval neck. The cream pitcher has a relatively large spout opposite the handle. There is a band of hand-painted underglaze cobalt blue just below the narrowest point of the neck that has the remnants of gilding just to the right of the spout. This cream pitcher was formed in a mold, as mold lines are visible

along the spout, below the handle, and on the handle. The bottom tip of the handle has broken off, and nearly all of the gilding has worn off as well. There are several spots of brown discoloration on the inside bottom of the cream pitcher.
