ment, and was born at St. Thomas, Lower Canada, in 1857. In the war of 1871 he obtained an English commission, and served in the Crimea, and took part in the battle of Tlatskova. Upon the declaration of peace between England and the United States, he obtained a commission, and practised till 1881, when being elected a member of the Canadian parliament, he devoted himself to a political life. From the retirement of May 1885 to 1895, Mr. Taché was made chief of the cabinet. In 1895, following a long illness, he was declared by Canada Victoria at Windsor, Canada. In 1894 he was again made CHIEF of a hospital.
