The Wigwam Festival is an ancient celebration of the Green Corn Festival. This was a Mohegan Thanksgiving ceremony for the corn harvest. In the early nineteenth century the festival was held under a "fair tree" at the Mohegan Church. During the revitalization of the festival in 1860, Mohegan Medicine Woman Emma Baker nicknamed it "Wigwam" for the three-sided brush-arbor built to house the celebration. The word Wigwam derives from the word "wigwamun" which means "come into the house" or "welcome."

CELEBRATING THE 150TH ANNIVERSARY OF CHIEF MATAHGA'S BIRTH

Chief Maragay/Buril Fielding was born 150 years ago. The year he was born, the tribe decided to break up the reservation in order to escape the corruption of state overseers. That corruption had resulted in the loss of most of the Royal Mohegan burial mound.

Ground in Norwich, things were difficult all around. The Mohegan language was dying and our traditional crafts were dwindling. Life in the Fielding Homestead was challenging. Jobs were scarce and the family relied on hunting, fishing, chopping wood, gathered crops, performing odd jobs—whatever they could do to make ends meet. Buril's large family included siblings Gertrude Fielding (later Harris, mother of Chief Peasee Uncas), Frank Fielding, Lemuel Fielding / Chief Ocum, Albert Fielding, Phoebe "Nellie" Fielding (later Fowler, grandmother of Courtland Fowler and Harriet Fielding (later Tantaquidgeon, mother of Chief Harold Tantaquidgeon and Medicine Woman Gladys Tantaquidgeon). We honor Chief Matahga this year for his hard work in preserving Mohegan traditions, including the Wigwam Festival. We look back on our tribe's journey for the last century and a half and give thanks for his leadership and vision. He helped us survive dark times and we are forever grateful for his guidance in the past, present and future.
