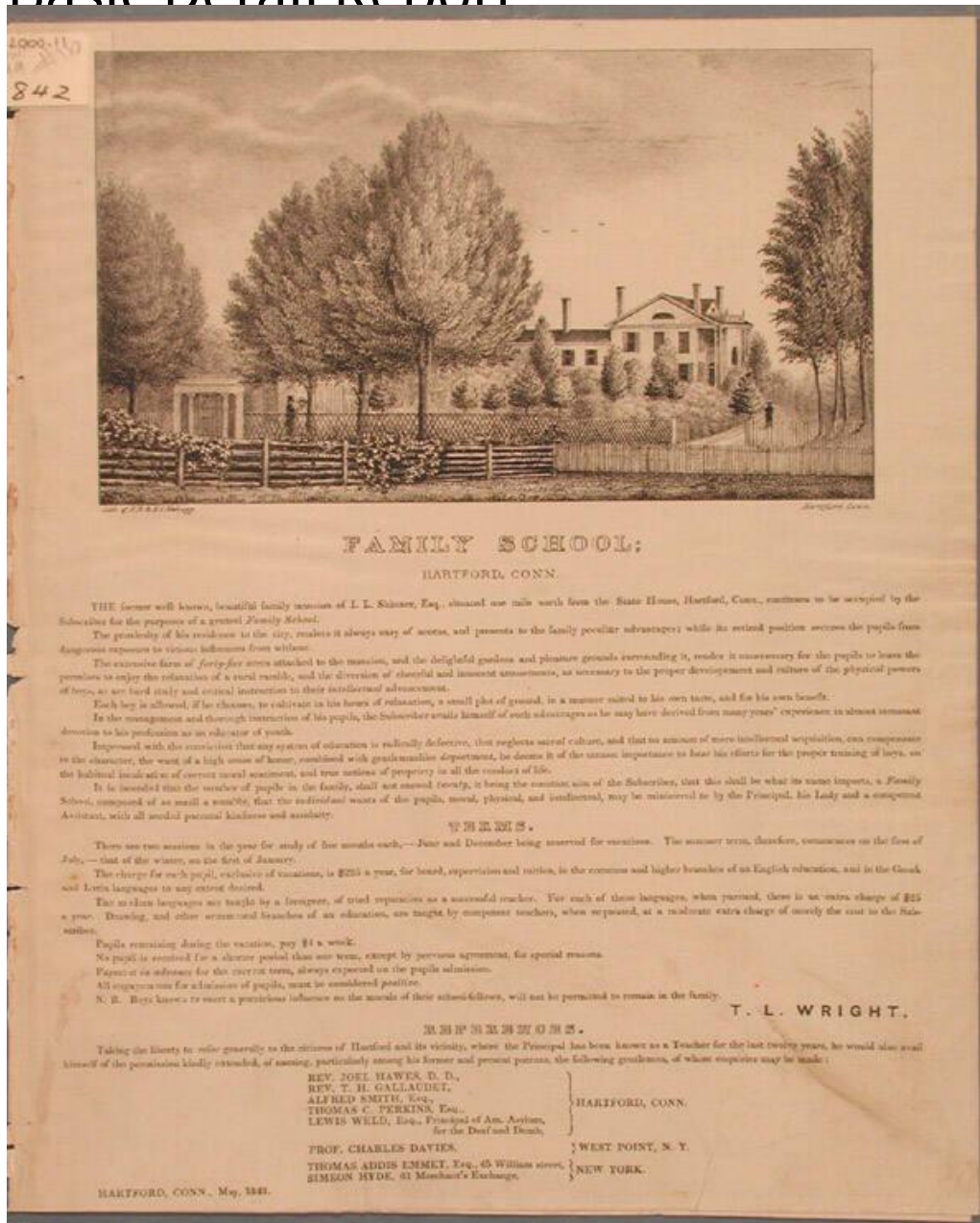


Basic Detail Report



FAMILY SCHOOL;

HARTFORD, CONN.

THE former well known, beautiful family mansion of L. L. Skinner, Esq., situated one mile north from the State House, Hartford, Conn., continues to be accepted by the subscribers for the purpose of a great *Family School*.

The proximity of his residence to the city, renders it always easy of access, and presents to the family peculiar advantages; while its retired position secures the pupils from dangerous exposure to various influences from without.

The extensive farm of forty-five acres attached to the mansion, and the delightful gardens and pleasure grounds surrounding it, render it necessary for the pupils to leave the premises to enjoy the relaxation of a rural ramble, and the diversion of cheerful and innocent amusements, as necessary to the proper development and culture of the physical powers of boys, as are hard study and cerebral instruction to their intellectual advancement.

Each boy is allowed, if he chooses, to cultivate in his hours of relaxation, a small plot of ground, in a manner suited to his own taste, and for his own benefit.

In the management and thorough instruction of his pupils, the Subscriber avails himself of such advantages as he may have derived from many years' experience in almost constant devotion to his profession as an educator of youth.

Impressed with the conviction that any system of education is radically defective, that neglects sacred culture, and that no amount of mere intellectual acquisition, can compensate for the character, the want of a high sense of honor, combined with graduation in department, he deems it of the utmost importance to base his efforts for the proper training of boys, on the habitual inculcation of correct moral sentiment, and true notions of propriety in all the conduct of life.

It is intended that the members of the family, shall not stand *couple*, it being the constant aim of the Subscriber, that this shall be what its name imports, a *Family School*, composed of as small a number, that the individual wants of the pupils, moral, physical, and intellectual, may be ministered to by the Principal, his Lady and a competent Assistant, with all needed parental kindness and assiduity.

TERMS.

There are two sessions in the year for study of five months each,--June and December being reserved for vacations. The summer term, therefore, commences on the first of July,--that of the winter, on the first of January.

The charge for each pupil, exclusive of vacations, is \$250 a year, for board, superintention and tuition, in the common and higher branches of an English education, and in the Greek and Latin languages to any extent desired.

Two or three languages may be taught by a foreigner, of tried reputation as a successful teacher. For each of these languages, when pursued, there is an extra charge of \$25 a year. Drawing, and other ornamental branches of an education, are taught by competent teachers, when required, at a moderate extra charge of nearly the cost to the Subscriber.

Pupils remaining during the vacation, pay \$1 a week.

No pupil is received for a shorter period than one term, except by previous agreement, for special reasons.

Payment is deferred for the current term, always expected on the pupils admission.

All engagements for admission of pupils, must be considered positive.

N. B. Boys known to exert a pernicious influence on the morals of their school-fellows, will not be permitted to remain in the family.
